
Meantime lets all make hay while the sun shines!



NON CONRORMITY - There was a growing movement of non conformity in the 18th - 19th centuries. Many different Protestant churches or chapels were set up, it was no different in Lopen.

In the 18th century, there were two groups of non conformists. In the houses of Joshua Gummer and Peter Horsey, Presbyterians met, and Horsey's house was also licenced for Anabaptists. His house was also used by Methodists! He really was hedging his bets!

In 1759, licences were issued for both Baptists and Presbyterians.

There was a young man called John Rowe, who was born in Lopen in 1788 whose family were Baptists. He had a very basic education, but taught himself English and Latin. He went on to learn Greek in Bristol, where he met his wife. He then set off for Jamaica as the first Baptist missionary, where he taught many children to read and write, as well doing some missionary work. He sadly became ill and died in 1816, but an achievement at the time for someone born into poverty and self-taught.

The Congregationalists started in a private house in 1825, with meetings held in a small room until 1864, when a local man called Samuel Hebditch, (who was also a preacher) built the chapel.

Like the church, Congregations declined, until the chapel was sold off in 1952.



Luckily we still have All Saints and a Parocial Parish Council to take care of the church, which like so many villages, irrespective of religious beliefs and interest, remain cornerstones of a village life and structure. **JOAN FARRIS**

Lopen History Casebook Chapter 11 - LOPEN CHURCHES

Sadly, many of us no longer go to church, but until the 19th century, it was compulsory. You had to have a very good reason not to attend, otherwise you would be taken to court and fined!

Records for Lopen church, go back to 1209, when the de Meriet family granted the chapel of Lopen to the canons of Bruton. It then went to Bristol but in 1574, burial rights were given to the chapel, thereby severing links with the mother church and priests were then required to serve it.

Before the Reformation in the 16th Century, it was of course Roman Catholic, but then became Protestant, as was the law at the time.

In 1577, John Vawdye became the curate, but was found to be "unmeet " for the job," being a Jersey man, not having the English tongue, and unlearned". There is no record of who appointed someone so unsuitable!

By. 1854, services were held in the morning with 150 people attending. In the afternoon, there were 250, and the same in the evening. 60 to 80 children attended Sunday School in the morning and afternoon. This of course was at the height of the local flax industry, when many more people lived and worked in the village.

The present church was probably built in the 14th-15th century, but very little of if remains. The building was much altered and added to in the 19th century, mainly to accommodate the growing population.

It is said that the pews were deliberately made to be uncomfortable so that you couldn't drop off during the sermon!
It was usual for the 'well to do' people to pay an annual fee for their own family pew.

It was a saying at the time that the 'Toffs went to church, and everyone else went to Chapel'! And then came the non-conformists...

Weather report 4th July 2025 - Jeremy Rook

May and June continued the dry theme of the previous 4 months with approximately one third of the Long Term Average (LTA) rainfall for the 2 months.

It is interesting that the aquifer to the North East of the village is keeping the water flowing in Church Street/Rydon Lane and in the stream that forms the Eastern edge of the parish -albeit with reduced flows. This is a result of the wet Autumn and Winter – it is hard to remember now the very wet January and above-average February.

It will be interesting to see if the weather repeats the 1976 pattern when a very dry Spring and early Summer gave way to downpours in late August.

The driest calendar year I have recorded was 2011 with 610mm in total (one third of the LTA) but the driest 6 months so far was in 1990 with 151mm March to August inclusive (42% LTA).

There are a number of us in the parish with thatched roofs and the continued dry weather makes us concerned about the possibility of sparks from garden bonfires and barbecues, so keep your eyes oen and flames down!
