MONTHLY MEETING ROUND-UP

Not a lot to report this period. The SSDC are still trying to get themselves organised ahead of the Unified County Council. Along with the rest of the country, they are also reporting financial challenges and looking to see what needs to be cut to support the main services, all in addition to the cost of living issues.

There was some response to the Local Community Network (LCN) survey, results of which are due sometime in the new year.

PLANNING

No major planning reviews underway at the moment, other than the Council have yet to approve their own application for the Lopenhead Roundabout advertising boards, which may have to be reduced in size.

As we go to print a new application consultation regarding the Mill House on Merriott Road has been submitted.

DEFIBRILLATOR

A second defibrillator is going to be placed in the village, on the west side of the village, (the one we have is in the Church porch) but we need suggestions for suitable siting PLEASE! Any ideas contact a Parish Councillor.

SSID

Village Speed Camera - ongoing reporting and tracking, to try and get further enforcement signage and actions in the village.

On the subject of speeding, the fact that the unclassified roads generally have a default speed to the National Speed limit, means that down your typical country single track the actual speed limit is classified as 60mph. A local instance being Broomhill Lane and Higgins Grave Lane - which makes them faster than the Watergore/Lopenhead main road, which is 40mph. This means that anyone with their Sat Nav set to find the fastest possible route (as most delivery drivers do), will divert themselves on to roads that are a challenge at 20-30mph. Highways can offer no solution to this, saying its the Sat Nav companies that need to sort this out.

GENERAL

Hedges, dog poo bins and more - continuing issues about the regularity of hedge and verge cutting round our narrow lanes are being raised to the Council, along with emptying the dog-poo bin in Kitchen Lane more frequently. Also taking this up with the Ranger.

Lopen Remembers...

This year villagers and anyone passing through would have noticed a marked increase in the Remembrance Day visibility. In addition to the two 'Tommies' at either end of the village, large poppies were very much in evidence (thank you Trevor), and due to the research of WW1 historian Peter Forrester and the diligence of Lopen villager and RAF veteran Trevor Power, details of each of the Lopen fallen, with a military and family profile were put together. These were laid out seven days prior and seven days after Remembrance Day in All Saints Church. In addition to which the same history was displayed as close as possible to their place of residence of the time. A fitting tribute. Thank you.









There has always been a strong connection between Christmas and music, whether that is the traditional carols sung in candlelit churches or pop songs played on loud speakers as mulled wine is drunk at Christmas markets.

The first music associated with Christmas is thought to have originated in the 4th century with Latin hymns. Carols in the English language appeared in 1426 when an English chaplain named John Awdlay listed twenty five "Caroles of Cristemas" sung by groups of wassailers who travelled from house to house.

Indeed some of today's most popular carols including "The Twelve Days of Christmas" and "God rest ye merry gentlemen" originate from the 16th century.

Being surrounded by background festive music in shops, on the radio and in Christmas Fayres can mean that we don't take time to truly appreciate the beauty and meaning of these songs. The classical composer Igor Stravinsky once said of music "To listen is an effort and just to hear is no merit. Even ducks can hear music".

This Christmas, let us take time to enjoy and truly listen to music, whether that be singing along to carols at a church service or jiving to the beat of "Rocking around the Christmas Tree".

In our own village there are various opportunities to raise our voices in seasonal songs, including the 'Lopen Lights-On' on 4 December and the candlelit carol service at All Saints on 20 December, following which you will be rewarded for your efforts with mulled wine and mince pies.

So look forward to seeing - and hearing - you there!




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Always look on the bright side...

A local story from the community about a subject we can all get involved in.

About 3 years ago following a national initiative called 'Eco-Church', Lopen set up a Churchyard Eco-Group. Under the guidance of Mary Chapman, volunteers - often up to 18 at a time - have been involved in developing the ecology around the Churchyard. this has covered as diverse things as reduced mowing, bird boxes, planting, bug hotels and CCTV of animal movements - and anything else appearing in the Churchyard!

The team of strimmers who cut the wildflower meadow area in August all had to keep a safe distance, which brought to mind the origins of songs like 'One Man went to Mow', which apparently were designed to keep mowers a safe distance apart with their scythes - at the start of each new verse the next mower would start, by which time the previous mower was a safe distance away. I was informed of this by an 80 year old neighbour. He also reported that the 'dog' in the song refers actually to a stick used to lift up fallen hay.

This same neighbour also referred to the Green Woodpecker - which can be heard and seen in the Churchyard as a 'Yaffle' - so called due to its call. And Blackbirds were called 'ouzel-birds, robins and wrens are just the male and female of the same species and hence the names Cock Robin and Jenny Wren.

All these birds, together with three fledging Sparrow hawks have all come to inhabit our little Churchyard, bringing song and joy to an otherwise understandably quiet place.

Finally, an interesting sighting at the end of summer was a humming-bird hawk moth. This migrant visitor from mainland Europe is quite rare, and was spotted using its improbably long tongue to feed on flowers left at a graveside.

Misnomers.

The known names of places in this Village and why they were given them can be obvious and clearly descriptive. Frog Street and Water Street leading not unsurprisingly to Water Lane and not too far away from Mill Lane. They are in the lowest area and closest to Lopen Brook and the water draining into it, Holloway is hollowed into its high hanks.

School Lane was probably a narrow path until the school was built there. This was when the thatched building next to the church, used as the school at the latter part of the 19th century, was no longer thought to be large enough or a suitable place to educate the children of Lopen. A purpose-built school became necessary and possible with a house built for a teacher at the same time. When the local schools were reorganised and that building was closed, the school became two homes, the school house another, and the space for the play ground another.

Church Street was called Higher Street, so why change it? What was it higher than? And why not always Church Street as it had been shown drawn on a map of 1774.

Mill Lane, appropriately named although the original mill is less obvious as no longer in use, however the existence of Flax Mill Cottage clarifies that one. The second Old Mill was Hinton Mill which no longer has Hinton in the name and is no longer a Mill. It became part of Lopen because of a boundary change from the natural boundary of the brook.

For some reason Mill Farm and the Mill with the last cottages towards Merriott Hill. became officially part of Lopen, and a loss for Hinton St George. Snapant or its earlier Strap Ant name on the Fosse Way towards Dinnington, is of unclear origin. And what was the Poulett Arms, a hostelry with stabling at Lopenhead, some further transformation on is equally well-known as the Lopen Raj.

Cross Tree is an obvious name for a junction with a large oak tree of indeterminate age But it is not at a crossroads. It is apparent that not everybody in this Village knows of the existence of the site or the remains of a mediaeval Village Cross.

So, a thousand years further on where are the mediaeval fair or the mediaeval Cross? If you stand to the just to left of the Cross Tree looking towards the main road through the village, the lump of ham hill stone unlike the others standing to protect the notice board and now worn down, is still visible and all that remains above ground. We have to ask ourselves why was that tree planted in a way to conceal possibly the oldest landmark we have. And what else has been hidden within our boundaries old or new?
