#### **Lopen Brook Catchment Flood Group**

Involving Kingstone, Allowenshay, Dinnington, Hinton St George, the Seavingtons & Lopen

With autumn fast approaching after an unusually dry summer and the rain returning, sharp showers revive flooding memories for the beginning of the year.

There is no doubt that climate change is changing rainfall patterns, with the increased intensity of storms being a particular concern for causing flooding not just near major watercourses, but anywhere water runs off the land. Flooding and its consequences affect us all in Lopen.



We can't do anything about the weather, but there are things we can all do to mitigate its consequences. That is what the purpose of the Lopen Brook Catchment Flood Group is. The aim is to bring together interested parties; householders, Parish Councils, landowners, farmers and local industry. Then, with the assistance and guidance of outside agencies such as Somerset Council (SC), The Farming & Wildlife advisory group (FWAG), Wessex Water (WXW) and the Somerset Rivers Authority (SRA) to assess our main risk areas, causes of the risk and how the risks can be reduced. As some of you will be aware, there has already been a preliminary meeting with FWAG and the SRA in attendance, which was very positive, but there is still time to get involved and more help is needed and welcomed so please do get in touch (see below).

Primary tasks for the Flood Group to undertake before a second meeting both within Lopen and further afield are:

Critically, form a Core Group across the Catchment: This is a community-driven venture so we need a small number of people who are willing to commit to put in some time undertaking both the information gathering in their parishes and also meeting with the wider catchment reps to undertake any admin, research etc., and to prepare for further meetings. So if you'd like to be involved please contact as below

- Investigation starting points for marking on maps with photographic evidence where possible:
  - What are the key flooding issues identified within each community e.g. highways flooding, buildings/internal flooding, gardens/land/yards?
  - · Which areas of each village are worst affected by flooding?
  - o Is it surface water, fluvial (river) or combined flooding?
  - Are there any issues that have had attempts at addressing them and what
    was the result? Can successful ones be replicated elsewhere with similar
    circumstances, or if they were unsuccessful, why, and what might be an
    alternative solution?
  - Extend connections with local farmers and landowners in the relevant areas and request their knowledge, input and ideas on the issues

## Always look on the bright side...

Rainfall report 31st August 2025 - Jeremy Rook

Hurrah, the 6 months of drought seems to have broken with 32 mm of rain in the last week!

The period 1<sup>st</sup> March to 31<sup>st</sup> August this year has been the lowest 6 month period since I have been recording with 135 mm of rain – the second lowest was the same period in 1990 when I recorded 151 mm. In the same 6 months last year I recorded 391 mm so quite a difference.

There has been a lot of maize grown in this area this year. In UK conditions maize is regarded by farmers as something of a drought insurance – provided it has enough moisture to germinate. Early sown crops have looked good but some of the later sowings are poor due to the lack of rain since sowing. Early sown crops are often grown under what looks like plastic sheeting, but is in fact sheeting made of biodegradable potato starch, which disappears as the Spring goes on.

In this country the whole of the maize plant is chopped up and made into maize silage, which is a first rate high energy feed for cows. In warmer countries like the USA or Southern France, only the cobs are stored and the maize grains are ground up to make maize meal, which can be fed to poultry as well as pigs and humans.

Maize flour is famously made into polenta in Italy - to me it tastes as I imagine wallpaper paste tastes. (Ed - hence the invention of sauces and pesto!)

The Americans call maize "corn" which is short for "Indian Corn" because the first settlers from Europe found the natives growing it. Cornflour is of course the refined and sieved maize meal.

A lot of the maize around Lopen will not be used to fill cows stomachs this Winter but will be used to satisfy the appetite of the digester at Frogmary Green.

#### CHAPTER 12 - WATER, WATER EVERYWHERE.

Why Water Street, Water Lane and Frog Street?

There was once an abundance of water in Lopen, but much of it is now gone - bar the occasional flood as mentioned earlier. Our main source of water is Lopen Brook. It was much larger at one time and operated two mills.

Lopen Mill was first used as a flour mill in the 13th century, and continued as such until it was mechanised and used as a flax mill in the 19<sup>th</sup> century.

Hinton Mill, which was on the corner of Hinton Road and Merriott Road, was used for some years as a flour mill for Hinton St. George, and likewise in the 19<sup>th</sup> century, briefly was a flax mill.

The brook must have been quite large and powerful to run two mills, and there were at least two smaller streams running into it. There were several smaller streams in the village, mostly coming from springs, many of which are still around.

It was likely that the Romans built their villa close to what became Hinton Mill because of the easy access to fresh running water.

One of the springs came from Seavington way, and joined the spring at Manor Farm to create a brook which went over Kitchen Lane, where local children caught minnows. Manor Farm had its own well and four watercress beds, which many people still remember. The spring stream was at some point blocked and diverted to go straight to the brook. There was also a stream on the other side of Water Street, which went behind the houses and there is still a culvert in Applehay which took the water away to join the brook.

With all that water around it, it's no wonder it got given its present name!

Frog Street is likely to have been called that as there was a large pond before the bend, which was always full of frogs! There were several springs in Lopen creating streams, and the one which never seems to run dry, is the one in Rydon Lane. That also flows through gardens and into the brook. It can still get very wet down there! In the past the spring fed streams were used by farmers to keep their milk churn cool.

Before water was "on tap", people relied on wells, which many folk had in their gardens. If they did not have access to one, they would use the village well. This was situated in Holloway in the bank on the right hand side, but is difficult to see. It had a wooden door on the

front. There was not so much traffic then! All this water was lost several years ago, when a farmer at Sockety dug a bore hole, and the water table dropped by several feet.
