

Sunday School Room - Update - Steve Chapman

The June/July issue outlined the Sunday School Room project.

At that time we had raised £18,500 towards the target of £60,000.

The great news is that this has now swollen to £37,000.

We were awaiting a Lottery Awards for a decision. However, they are now withdrawing the current £10,000 scheme and replacing it with a £20,000 scheme in November to which we will apply.

The re-thatch contract has been awarded and is scheduled for next summer. The floor, etc will be scheduled once the additional funds have been raised.

RAFT (Refugee Aid From Taunton) after eight years continues to request donations to send to refugee camps overseas, with some for refugees settling in Taunton and now volunteering at the charity. Raft has a Facebook page showing immediate needs.

From October we are seeking clean warm washable clothing and suitable footwear for all – from babies to older people. Unopened hygiene products, toiletries and off-the-shelf medication for every group are always in short supply, plus new underclothing. At present prams, buggies and travel cots are needed too. No bedding please except blankets.

Refugees from wars and from natural and climate disasters are constantly increasing and it seems an insurmountable issue. US President Theodore Roosevelt once said, 'I did what I could, where I was, with what I had.' RSG and Raft would say the same. While we continue to collect and receive donations, fundraising is difficult without the support of volunteers - all help is very much appreciated.

Always look on the bright side...

Rainfall report 19th September

July was a wet month with 111 mm of rain, twice the long term average and my second wettest July (after July 2009). A friend in Haselbury Plucknett recorded 190 mm

Over the Wessex catchment area it was the sixth wettest July since rainfall records began in 1891. To illustrate the variable nature of rain, July 2016 was my driest ever month with just 2.7 mm recorded. August was a pretty average month, with 72 mm of rain, mostly in the last 10 days. And September had a wet spell of 46mm in just 3 days, but nothing out of the ordinary.

Compared with the South West Water area, we in the Wessex area benefit from having large aquifers (underground water storage in the rocks and soil), so we are not as vulnerable to variations in rainfall.

The South West Water area of Devon and Cornwall has large areas of impermeable rock (granite) which does not store water. It also has a population which at least doubles during the dry summer period. Building more reservoirs is very costly and because consumption is increasing SW Water is looking at desalination plants to extract fresh water from the sea.

The problem of storm discharges of sewage water (much in the news) is caused by the fact that in many towns and cities rain water runoff from buildings built before about 1980 is directed into the sewers and causes massive overloads at the sewage works. This historic problem will take a lot of time and money to rectify in the next few years – and a lot of digging up of streets! On the bright side - we will eventually have better sewage!



Lopen History Casebook

CHAPTER 3 - Village People

A village is made up of its people, and Lopen is no exception. Some families have lived here for very many years, and some of the descendants of those people are still living here today. A few families can be found on the 1841 census, including the **Denmans**, **Rylands**, **Pitchers** and **Cables**. The **Nortons** are here from 1861.

One of the earliest village records in 1527, tells us that a curate was appointed to the church. His name was John Vawdye, and he was described as "unmeet for the charge, being a Jersey man, not having the perfect English tongue, and unlearned." That certainly wouldn't happen today! And his name is long forgotten.

A man called John Rowe, was born in Lopen in 1788 into a poor family. He was a glover in Yeovil, but educated himself in English and Latin. He was a devout Baptist, and went to the Baptist mission in Yeovil. He married, and in 1814, they both set sail for Jamaica, where he became the first Baptist minister there. A story of courage and determination.

In 1835, John **Templeman** was the vicar here. He lived in Cross Tree House, which became the vicarage.

His son, Thomas Templeman was a sailcloth manufacturer. He built Lopen House opposite the church, and had a tower built into it, so that he could look over to his factory by the mill, to keep an eye on the proceedings! He sold the business in 1861. He had a stock of sailcloth of 1,000 bolts (an old measurement), which was sold in London.

Religion has always played a big part in village life. In the 19th century, there were a few Protestant denominations holding meetings in private houses. There were quite a few Congregationalists, and a preacher called the Reverend Samual **Hebditch**, built the chapel in 1864.

The Denmans have been involved in the village for many years. They were landowners, farmers and carpenters, and they owned the flax factory at one stage, which they took over from the Sutton brothers. One Denman lived in Applehay in Frog Street, and another one built Ina's House in Church Street.

The **Giffords** were a wealthy family, first recorded in 1764. They had property in the area, and later lived in Ballarat in Frog Street, where twine was produced. One of Lopen's two rope walks was situated there.

The **Nortons** seem to have arrived in the village by 1861. Benjamin Norton was a cattle dealer who lived at Ballarat. Elizabeth Norton was the school mistress, and lived in the school house in School Lane.

Their descendants still live here.

There are several more interesting old families, but we will end with a more recent one. This story was given to me by Alan **Gillard**, who was born on a

farm at Lopen Head.



This is a picture of his grandfather with probably the only horse which returned to Somerset after the First World War. He said he was still fine, but tended to go too fast!

Anyone who feels a similar long term connection with the village, do get in touch, the more we can collate and curate the better.
