

#### LOPEN PARISH COUNCIL

As the term for the current Council draws to a close, I thought I would look ahead to what I see as the main challenge for the Parish Council going forward. But before that, it is a pleasure for me as current chairman to offer our thanks and best wishes on behalf of the current Council and past chairmen and members, to our outgoing vice-chair, Nicola Norman. Many of you will not be aware that Nic has served for 20 years on LPC!

The Council has always encouraged new residents to join its ranks to bring new outlooks and skills (and on that point we still have two places to fill through co-option, so if you are interested please make contact), but it has been most important to anchor these within a longer term Lopen perspective – and it is this experience that Nic has been able to bring to the Council. As well her role as vice-chair, Nic has overseen footpaths, been a trusted contact for local feedback and managed the services of the village Lengthsman. The Lengthsman (now Ranger service) is where we commit the bulk of our budget and we know is highly prized by all villagers. Thank you Nic for your long and valued contribution! Nic is a great example of the volunteering spirit that small villages like Lopen rely on in order to be successful as communities - places where people want to settle and feel they belong. And it is the growing challenge of self-help that I want to turn to now.

The landscape of local government is rapidly changing. We have all heard about the benefits of localism (local people having more say about what happens where they live with more power and control devolved to local communities). In practice this means there is likely to be less funding for local services with an increasing requirement for local people to pick up the delivery of many services for themselves. So the challenge for Lopen in the future is how how to get more people active on behalf of the village and how to become more integrated as a *whole* village.

I have lived in Lopen for only eight years and during that time I have witnessed a reducing small group of people getting involved in general village matters and those that do often represent only a small part of our village. Over this Council's term we have struggled to recruit volunteers to help with projects like a village speed watch scheme and to help to monitor and record overweight vehicles travelling through the village. Defibrillator and life support training has seen slow take up. At the same time we have seen other village groups facing similar issues over the lack of new volunteers to sustain their activities. We need more people to actively take part in maintaining and improving our village for the benefit of all residents.

Showing willing and doing what we can to help ourselves will often release additional support from local authorities and services like the Police, so it can have a multiplier effect.

Our village is cut in half by an increasingly busy road and lacks a centrally located community hub. This throws up particular challenges to overcome but this should not be a barrier for greater community integration, involvement and sense of belonging for all. Accepting there are some aspects of our village we may never be able to change, having your say is by far the most important first step. After all, how is the Parish Council to know what to focus on if villagers don't tell us? I fully recognise of course, there are people who work extremely hard for the village in various ways, and as residents we should thank them all but more of us need to do more, whether it is simply giving your opinion or, better still, getting involved.

#### LOPEN PARISH COUNCIL ELECTIONS

There will be no election for our Parish Council on May 7th because there are only five candidates declared for the seven vacancies.

The five villagers who will become parish councillors after the election are existing councillors Barry Davolls, Stephen Crane, Teresa Sienkiewicz and Sarah Mason plus new councillor Nick Jones.

It is possible that other villagers might apply to be co-opted to the council to make the numbers up to the full complement of seven. Meanwhile, the present councillors remain in post until after May 7th.

The next elections for Lopen Parish Council will be held in May 2019.
