





Update from the Lopen Church Eco-Group

At the last committee meeting at the end of October it was decided that the policy for the year ahead would be mainly one of observation rather than action. Over the past three years or so we have achieved a lot. We have put up bird boxes and bug hotels; held group plantings of snowdrops and primroses, all dug from local gardens; put in native daffodil bulbs and planted plugs of native grassland plants in our wildflower area. This now needs time to develop and be nurtured.

We also managed two 'bio blitz' sessions, which proved successful in involving villagers, including many children, and we plan to repeat this in June 2024. The next boxes will be checked and emptied over the winter (they were all used last year) and we will continue our mowing regime, which seems to suit both humans and wildlife. The 2023 vintage compost is now almost full, and the 2022 vintage will be uncovered in the spring to allow villagers access for their own gardens.

The last couple of weeks have seen a pair of blackbirds in the churchyard. They are seen less regularly after the breeding season, reappearing during October/November. this is due to the fact they moult after breeding and whilst they wait for their new feathers to fully come through, they seek shelter in woods and hedges. Coupled with this many of our 'summer' blackbirds migrate to warmer climes like the south of France or Spain - although our very mild autumn has probably confused them as much as it has us! The ones that remain are joined by other migrants from Eastern Europe, often larger than our native species.

Lopen Christmas Casebook

CHRISTMAS CUSTOMS

Lopen usually celebrates Christmas with lots of lights round the village, and getting together to sing carols. Houses and the church are decorated, although according to tradition, this should not be done before Christmas Eve. It is a time for Christians to remember the birth of Jesus, but many of the customs which we celebrate now, are hundreds of years old, and date back to our pagan ancestors.

The Celts celebrated the winter solstice on December 21st, with the death of the old year, and beginning of the new. Bonfires were lit to encourage the sun to shine for another year. December 25th was a Roman festival in honour of the god Mithras, and celebrated the birth of the unconquered sun.

To the Norse people, it was Yuletide, and the Yule log was burnt on Christmas Eve. The tradition was carried on in Somerset with the burning of the "ashen faggot". It was made of a bundle of logs fastened with nine bands of ash. The faggot was placed on the fire, and as each band burst, much cider was drunk. The fire was often kept burning for the twelve days of Christmas, and a log may be kept to start the fire in the following year.

Bringing greenery into the house for decoration at the midwinter festival, is a custom of extreme antiquity. Evergreens were regarded as symbols of everlasting life. In Somerset, this was called "Christmassing" or "keeping Christmas" The greenery had to be removed on Twelfth night, and was mostly burnt. Mistletoe was sacred to the druids, and not allowed in churches except York Minster.

Carols probably originated from circular dances associated with dramatic performances. The carol of classical times was a major element to mark the passing of the winter solstice. In the 12th century, carols began to be taken up as Christian folk songs. Villages often had their own carols, and these still survive in Odcombe.

There is also a lovely Somerset carol, which we still sing today. **Come all you worthy gentlemen**, is an English folk carol of unknown authorship. It was collected from a Mr. Rapsey, of Bridgwater during the English Folksong revival at the beginning of the 20th century by Cecil Sharp. It was first published in 1905 in Sharp and Marson's Folk songs from Somerset. It is a variant of the carol God Rest You Merry, Gentlemen.

After carol singing we may go in and have a glass of mulled wine and a mince pie. Mince pies probably date back to Roman times, and were originally. "Coffin" shaped. Christians then referred to them as a crib, and sometimes put a baby Jesus in the pastry. They were made of chopped, minced meat, eggs, spices and raisins. Suet in the pie is the only survivor of the meat content today. It was traditional to eat a mince pie on every day for the 12 days of Christmas.

Twelfth night was a big celebration of the end of the Christmas period. It was originally old Christmas Eve, but when the Gregorian calendar came in in 1582, we lost 11 days, but the old customs carried on. We still take the decorations down January 5th.

Here's to a very Happy Christmas ' and as our ancestors said "Wassail" (good health) . JOAN FARRIS
