Lopen Music Weekend

Back in September a recital by French Horn player Benjamin Hartnell-Booth accompanied by Jonathan Delbridge on piano launched the 2025 Lopen Music Weekend. Here are some details and a reminder of the special occasion in our annual calendar...



The well attended event provided an attentive audience with a rare insight into the French Horn repertoire, demonstrating the wide variety of sounds and textures the instrument produces. Benjamin is an experienced orchestral player but this recital illustrated his subtlety and finesse performing chamber works by Beethoven, Dukas, Schumann and Poulenc. A horn sonata by York Bowen made considerable demands on both the horn player and pianist alike to navigate the florid, late romantic idiom of this interesting work. An entertaining encore of variations based on The Beatles 'Hey Jude' wrapped up a highly enjoyable evening of music.

The weekend concluded with Jonathan performing three Mozart piano sonatas on his 19th Century square piano to a capacity crowd on Sunday afternoon. Our grateful thanks to Jonathan for organising the Lopen Music Weekend and for raising £478 towards the upkeep of the church. KEITH HILL

Sunday 7 December – St John's Church, Yeovil – 2.30pm to 4pm



November Rainfall report - Jeremy Rook

Rainfall in September and October this year taken together were approximately average with September above average and October below. Groundwater levels are still low following the Summer drought – this can be checked by looking into ditches - you can see that except during heavy rain there is no water lying in the ditch bottoms yet.

Concerns have been raised about flooding during periods of heavy rain in the parish. Looking at the map we have a catchment area of several square miles stretching from Lopen Head to Eggwood (North to South) and Allowenshay to Lopen Mill (West to East).

Most of the rainfall running off in that several square miles is channelled into Lopen Brook which flows under the bridge on Merriott Road.

In the past land drainage and river management was in the hands of local Drainage Boards. These boards usually comprised local councillors, a few landowners and a professional engineer to oversee such works as they thought necessary. The drainage boards thus had a great incentive to ensure that floodwater was moved off their patch as quickly as possible, as affected locals would know who to blame if things went wrong.

Unfortunately responsibility was taken from the sensible locally based drainage boards and given to the Environment Agency which was stuffed with loads of bureaucrats who had never dug a ditch in their lives. The EA also thought that it was more important to protect newts and other wildlife than it was to keep people's homes free of flooding.

There has been a very great reduction in the amount of clearance downstream on the River Parrett and its tributaries like the Lopen Brook, and this is to my mind a major factor in the flooding problem in our area.

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


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
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Lopen History Casebook

CHAPTER 13 - FARMING IN LOPEN

There have always been farms in Lopen. The Domesday Book reveals that there were many sheep being kept in what was a small settlement.

The soil is said to be very good, and it was frequently made more fertile by the addition of marl, which was a clay like substance taken from a pit in the village, so it has always been a productive area. In the C18th, some arable land was typically managed by the three yearly cycle of 2 years of crops and in the third year the same land was left fallow to allow the soil to regenerate. This gave rise to growing more valuable crops, and in particular apples.

Between 1797 and 1803, orchard coverage nearly doubled in size. Many orchards grew cider apples as cider was often given to the labourers as part of their wages.

We have some knowledge of Court Farm, owned by the Goodlands (courtesy of the late V. Layzelle). There was the farm house, stables and a granary. The land continued up to the Fosse way (Broomhill/Snapant), and had many apple trees in it, having wonderful names like "Sheep's Nose, Morgan Sweets, Tom Putts and Beauty of Bath" as well as the more regular Cox and Russets. There were still sheep farms, and the wool may have been woven here, as cloth manufacture goes back to the late C17th.


By 1841 there were more than 12 farmers in the immediate area, employing many agricultural labourers. Wheat, barley and oats were grown, as well as hemp, beans, potatoes and peas. The hemp was used to make rope and twine, which was much needed on farms, and after harvesting, clover and other vetches were sown in order to put nitrogen back into the soil.

By 1888, there were 140 acres of meadow and pasture, which was needed for grazing sheep and cattle. In the late 18th century, there were also silk and flax weavers with cottages in Holloway housing some of the weavers. Flax fibre was grown to make 'dowlas', a type of rough sailcloth. As weaving and farming became more refined, dowlas became finer sail cloth, and finally linen, until superceded by cotton and man-made fibres. The weavers typically combined their work with small scale farming for food on our local fertile fields. The fields must have been a beautiful with the blue flowers in the spring and the orchard blossoms.

There are now only a few real farms left in the village, but agriculture has always played a large part in Lopen village life, and still does - reminded by our tractor traffic, sheep, cows and surrounding orchards. Flax, having been with us since the Bronze Age, is making a comeback as a soil regenerative plant and carbon absorber.
