THE QUIRKY TREE HOUSE HAS BEEN REMOVED FROM THE GARDEN OF CROSS TREE HOUSE

The tree house was created from a massive Monterey Cypress, over 150 years old and was the largest tree in Lopen. It was home to a colony of rooks and some owls, but due to its age it had begun to drop large branches that it could no longer support, and was becoming a danger to people, property and traffic. So it was dismantled in 2006 as it was too big to fell. Having been too big a presence to lose completely, John Milner left a 10 foot stump which was then hollowed out by a tree sculptor called Aidy. Then he installed a door in the side and a shingle roof on top. It could take 2 adults or 3 children and was much loved by people staying in Cross Tree House. At the time of writing it is for sale in Castle Reclamation in Martock.

RAINFALL UPDATE

Jeremy Rook has kindly supplied the following data: As the press reported, May was a dry month - I recorded 8mm in total against the Long Term Average of 59mm. In our catchment area it was the driest May since 1896. My 8mm was more rain than my driest month of July 2016 when I recorded 2.7mm in total for the whole 31 days.

Gardeners and farmers will be pleased that June has not followed suit. In June to date (27th) I have recorded a total of 74mm - over the average of 53mm. 31mm (that is 42% of the month's total so far), fell in the night of 18 -19 June - only a short distance away in Haselbury Plucknett, a friend recorded 58mm that night. In the 2020 six months to date, we are exactly on the Long Term Average despite the dry May, because of the very wet February.

SECURITY IN HOT WEATHER



As summer temperatures rise new opportunities arise for burglars and scammers. To keep cool we open windows and doors to encourage breezes

to flow through, but this also can encourage unwelcome 'opportunists' to come in as well!!

So do remember to:

- Avoid leaving downstairs windows open after you go to bed.

- If you're out enjoying the garden, make sure your front door is locked and any accessible windows are secure.

- Always close and lock windows and doors when leaving the property - even a small open window could entice a burglar.

- Ensure that any side entrance is secure, locked and not easy to climb over, even when someone is at home.

- Always pack away tools after a day tending to your garden or doing some DIY and make sure they're locked away and out of reach.

- Do not leave valuables visible through windows.

- Keep car & house keys out of sight and away from windows and doors.

Similarly, if you have a car:

- Do not leave valuables in sight of any potential thief.

- Remember to close the windows and lock the car when you park.
